

NWTAC ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

2022 AGM

The 56th Annual General Meeting was held in Yellowknife from September 15 to September 17, 2022.

Official business started with opening comments by NWTAC President Rebecca Alty, Minister Wawzonek on behalf of the Government of the Northwest Territories, and a welcome by the Yellowknives Dene First Nation. The President's Report, 2022 Annual Report, 2021 AGM Minutes, 2020-2021 Financial Statements, and the 2022-2023 Budget were presented and adopted. NWTAC also delivered updates on the Northern **Communities Insurance Program and Asset** Management. In addition, MACA presented the updates to the Municipal and Community Affairs and Accountability Framework, after which Housing presented the Housing NWT Renewal. We were also pleased to have presentations by our Guest Speaker, Massey Whiteknife and our MP, Michael McLeod.

We held the 2022 Elections for President and Four Directors – Two for Cities, Towns, and Villages and Two for Hamlets/Charter Communities/Tłįchǫ Government/Community Governments. 


